This is a lot like selecting a place to play or eat, you want some place clean and wholesome that provides what you and your children need. If your child has special needs, you will also need to be careful to see if the literal translation of the content or the "quick scan" version of the website will give your child the right impression. Is the quality of the research and content appropriate? Is the language used appropriate and at a level your child can understand? Preview the links from the site, avoid excessive advertising or popups, and make sure you are present the first several times your child accesses the site.
